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



The founders of KYP grew up in Kliptown and they have lived the challenges, understand the needs and are passionate about helping Kliptown's children rise above adversity.

KYP is a safe place for children to learn, have fun, work together and prepare themselves to be successful. We are empowering the next generation and have created a positive cycle where alumni give back to help children lift themselves out of poverty.

KYP has a staff of 20 young adults, the majority of whom grew up in Kliptown and faced the challenges that our members live with. We pride ourselves in having a passionate and motivated staff who see their work not only as a job, but also as a way to contribute to and effect positive change in their community.







Our 2023 achievements

We extended our program with the Smart Start playgroup that enrolled 150, three to five-year old kids and recruited 17-day mothers.

Four of our learners who were struggling with their vision received prescription eyeglasses.

300 learners from our community and 125 of our KYP members were successfully registered into schools for grade 8.

160 community members have completed and graduated from their basic computer literacy training.

30 learners registered into our matric rewrite program facilitated by **three** professional teachers.

200 community members have enrolled for online courses.

KLIPTOWN YOUTH PROGRAM

Provided a total of **328 320** hot lunch meals and 273 600 sandwiches to all 1 100 of our learners served over 50 000 meals every Friday to community members.

KYP received 1 900 digital and manual study guides for our grade 4 to 12 learners.

An impressive 82% pass rate from our class of 2023!

Seven of our 2022 post-matric obtained driver's licences and 15 obtained their learner's licences.





Our operating context

We are located in the Kliptown township of Soweto in Gauteng, South Africa, located 17km southwest of Johannesburg. The map below shows where we are located.



Kliptown is a suburb of the formerly black township of Soweto in Gauteng, South Africa, located 17km southwest of Johannesburg.

As the oldest residential district of Soweto, Kliptown has immense cultural and historical importance, as this is where the Freedom Charter was signed in 1955.

However, Kliptown still lacks essential needs such as schools, proper sanitation, electricity, health clinics, and more.

With a population of approximately 55 000, the unemployment rate runs as high as 80%, teenage pregnancy over 45%, and HIV/AIDS infection at 30%.

As a result, alcohol consumption, drug abuse and crime are common from a young age.

Despite these great challenges, the community of Kliptown possesses an incredibly strong spirit with an inspiring sense of culture and hope.

Since there are no schools within Kliptown itself, children must walk to schools in other towns.

The high cost of schooling, which includes school fees, uniforms, shoes, lunches and trips, prohibits many children of Kliptown from receiving proper schooling.

Furthermore, English is inadequately taught as a second language, which leads to low success rates in the matric (school-leaving) exams, thereby hindering future educational opportunities.

As all the leaders of KYP grew up in the community, they understand its needs and genuinely care about improving the lives of future generations.



Our operating model

Simply put, our operating model is dependent on the benevolence and aid of our supporters – a material stakeholder group for KYP – who provide the financial capital to propel and drive the activities of the organisation to effectively make a lasting impact in communities which we serve. Our programs impact a lot of children who come from disadvantaged backgrounds seeking a better future.

Activities and outputs



We successfully hosted three events, the financial literacy workshop, motivational Wednesday talk and work readiness workshops. We collaborated with Basa and Old Mutual in partnership. The workshops have shown a significant impact on the participants. by building confidence, resilience and self-esteem.

Output:

We hosted financial literacy workshops where the main objective was to equip the participants with knowledge and skills to achieve financial stability. The motivational Wednesday talks provided students provided students a platform to engage with inspirational speakers to help them have a positive mindset. Lastly, we hosted a work readiness workshops to enhance the candidates employability and career prospects, 63 candidates who successfully enrolled completed their training.



We made great progress with our education program this year and the results speak for us. This program helps students to prepare for their exams and have a chance to improve their academic performance. The subjects that we are offering are Mathematical Literacy, Geography, English First Additional Language and Home Language.

Output:

We successfully enrolled 30 students in this program. We have received support from BEE123 who donated 1 900 digital and manual study guides for the grade 4 to 12 learners. We made use to an assessment to evaluate how well or poorly the students are performing and to also track where improvements are needed so tutors can focus on those subjects.



We have dedicated six days a week to feed our learners nutritional meals to improve their health and well-being which helps them to focus in their activities. We also initiated Friday meals to the members of the community to cover food scarcity.

Output:

Successfully provided a total of **328 320** hot lunch meals and **273 600** sandwiches to all **1 140** of our learners as well as **50 000** meals to the members of the community.



Our operating model continued



This program serves as a support centre for members and their families where they can seek the advice of counsellors in a safe, confidential environment. The issues focused on are vast and may include behaviour-related issues in children, difficulties at school, family violence, drug and alcohol abuse, teenage pregnancy, crime, poverty and HIV/AIDS, to name a few.

Output:

Assisted 31 learners who lacked proper identification with the application and collected their identity documents. We also helped a family get the proper fingerprint verification for their identity document. Successfully organised a parent workshop bringing together KYP parents and their relatives to involve them in their children's lives. Provided valuable assistance to ± 1400 community members through social grant applications, unemployment fund applications and identity document application bookings.



Our computer lab is so important in our community as it provides a safe and supportive environment for community members to use computers and get assistance with their job searches and resume writing. This enhancement supports both internal communication and educational initiatives, creating a more immersive learning experience.

Output:

We have installed two televisions and one in the boardroom for meeting presentations and another in the computer lab for end-user computer literacy classes. We have been able to assist 180-200 community members, and we hope to continue in making a positive impact on more community members in the future.



Our performing arts program has been a significant contributor to our fundraising efforts. We have performed for tour visitors from different parts of the world, which has helped us raise funds and we are happy to share that we were invited by two corporate events and we have been approached by drumming companies to perform drumming for their clients.

Output:

Our KYP team embarked on a cultural exchange and global trip to Thailand, to showcase our extraordinary dance, and beautiful heritage and exchange cultures with the people of **Thailand.** We also travelled to San Fransisco to connect with our partner school, Mark Day School for two weeks where we showcased out gumboot dance. In addition we managed to add 15 drums to our arts equipment.



This program saves a lot of the young individuals from substance abuse and peer pressure from the streets.

Output:

Our under 17 years boys won the Eldorado Local Football Association, the under 15 boys secured second place, the under nine boys were **third** place and the under **15** girls achieved a respectable fourth place.



The program's primary objective is to assist our students in obtaining their **driver's licences**. Hundertprozent has been a key partner in this transformative journey, and their unwavering support has been instrumental in the success of our students.

To date, more than 70 of our students have successfully completed their licensing requirements.

New KYP programs



Our centre now offers a chance for individuals to improve their matric results or to complete their high school education. We are collaborating with the Peter Lengene Adult Training Institute to ensure our students have the best chance to succeed. We have enrolled 30 students into our program.



Our centre has collaborated with Smart Start to provide a transformative playgroup service for families in our community. This program offers a nurturing environment for children aged three-five years old, under the care of trained day mothers for three hours daily while the mothers attend to their morning routines. We enrolled 150 children into the program, making a significant impact in the community.

2023 program success

Vocational development program

Hosting empowerment workshops at our centre plays a crucial role in transforming the lives of our learners and young adults in the community. These programs offer an opportunity for personal and professional development. And by investing in the continuous development of individuals strengthens the overall capacity and effectiveness of our community. We inspire them to pursue their dreams, empower them to overcome their challenges and strive for greatness. Through these workshops, we facilitate the transformation of our community. Our aim is to empower individuals to reach their full potential and contribute to creating a brighter future for all.

Financial literacy workshops:

 A workshop on financial literacy was conducted in collaboration with Basa and Old Mutual, in partnership with KFC. The workshops were aimed at providing our staff members and high school students with the necessary skills to enhance their financial literacy. The participants learned about budgeting, financial planning, and how to effectively use credit. The main objective was to equip them with the knowledge and skills required to achieve financial stability.

Motivational Wednesday talks:

· Motivational talks have been shown to have a significant impact on our student's mental and emotional well-being. Providing a platform for students to engage with inspirational speakers who share the same background, can help them gain valuable insights into different areas of life and develop a positive mindset. We have successfully hosted eight motivational talks with

different professionals. These talks build our student's confidence, resilience, and self-esteem, which can lead to improved academic performance and better relationships with their peers. Motivational talks are a great way to inspire and empower students to reach their full potential.

Work readiness workshops:

- Conducted specialised work readiness workshops that were facilitated by seven human resources executives from diverse workspaces. In total 63 candidates who were enrolled on the program successfully completed their training.
- · Gaining skills that the work readiness program offers is of great importance and has enhanced our candidate's employability and career prospects. During the specialised workshops, our enrolled candidates received training on various essential skills such as communication, teamwork, problem-solving, time management and professional etiquette. These skills are highly required by employers across different industries.











Educational program



Grade 12 rewrite centre:

• We have extended our program and added the matric rewrite program. The program has been running successfully with 30 learners enrolling in the program. The subjects that we offer include Mathematical Literacy, Geography, English First Additional and Home Language.

Donations to the program:

- BEE123 donated 1 900 digital and manual study guides for our grade 4 to 12 learners who have all the subjects. The guides donated by BEE123 are of great importance to our grade 4 to 12 learners as they provide comprehensive information and guidance on various subjects.
- With the help of these study guides, students can prepare for their exams effectively and improve their academic performance.

Assessment results:

- An important part of assessing our influence on the student's development is the termly assessment we administer. We use these evaluations to determine how well or poorly our students are performing where changes need to be made, and which subjects a tutor must concentrate on more in light of the student's development.
- · Measuring from term 1 to term 4 with our internal assessment, we have seen a big improvement in our learner's progress.

Psychosocial support program

Our psychosocial program is a vital resource for addressing the diverse needs of our community. Our program provides a safe and confidential environment where our learners can receive comprehensive support services from our social worker. Our program addresses a range of issues including behavioural problems, family violence, substance abuse, and health concerns. We also provide academic and career support as part of our early intervention and prevention efforts. Our goal is to empower our community members and ensure their overall well-being is nurtured to provide them with a smooth academic experience.

Identification document assistance for learners:

• Identified and assisted 31 learners who lacked proper identification with the application and collected their Identity documents. Currently we are still awaiting one Identity document.

Fingerprint reflection for a family:

Assisted a family of five who were facing difficulties using their identity documents due to fingerprint errors at
the department. This issue caused a hurdle in their lives as they were unable to use their Identity documents
for verification purposes in various government and private institutions. The family was helped to get
fingerprint reflection at Home Affairs, which will have a positive impact on their lives as they will now have
access to services from institutions and companies that require identity verification.

Late birth registration assistance:

Assisted six community members in registering for their children's birth certificates to ensure legal recognition
and need access to essential services such as healthcare, education, and social services. Without a birth
certificate, it can be really difficult for parents to get their children the support they need to grow and thrive.

Educational assessment for students:

We conducted education assessments for 10 students in our program to identify any learning challenges they
may be facing in the classroom. This will help us provide them with the necessary support and resources to
overcome these challenges and succeed in their education. We are now eagerly awaiting special school
placement from the District Departments to ensure that these students receive the best education possible.

Community outreach achievements:

- Successfully organised three-day parent workshops, bringing together KYP parents and their relatives. This achievement highlights our commitment to involving parents actively in their children's lives, providing a platform for learning about future developmental stages and fostering a collaborative environment.
- Provided valuable assistance to ±1 400 community members through:
- Social grant applications
- Unemployment fund applications
- Identity document application bookings.









Information technology program

Inventory upgrade with MacBooks:

· Added 14 MacBooks to our inventory, significantly enhancing the speed and efficiency of our devices. These MacBooks are now utilised by the KYP team, facilitating faster and more streamlined operations within the organisation.









Performing arts program

Our performing arts program offers children an opportunity to engage in cultural activities such as dancing and drumming. Through this program, learners can express themselves creatively and have a worthwhile experience. Participating in these activities gives our learners a positive way to occupy their time, reducing the likelihood of them engaging in negative behaviours or spending time with negative influences. Our gumboots dance, which is open to both boys and girls, is renowned and has been performed at major events both in South Africa and abroad since the inception of our organisation. This experience not only helps us raise funds but also enables our members to travel around the world.

Global visit to Thailand and San Fransisco:

- Our KYP team embarked on a cultural exchange and global trip to Thailand, to showcase our extraordinary dance, and beautiful heritage and exchange cultures with the people of Thailand. This initiative not only celebrates our diverse performing arts but also fosters international connections and understanding. We sent five KYP members, two alumni, and one staff member to travel on this trip.
- Our team travelled to San Francisco, to connect with our partner school, Mark Day School for two weeks. Seven KYP members, two of our tutors, and three staff members were part of our delegation team. They dedicated time to teaching the learners our famous gumboot dance and spent additional time in the classroom exchanging ideas and knowledge. The experience was enriching for everyone.

Performing arts instruments:

• We have added 15 drums to our performing arts equipment and instruments. These drums are used during corporate events, where we perform for fundraising purposes and also teach attendees/clients how to drum.

Fundraising:

- Our performing arts program has been a significant contributor to our fundraising efforts. We have performed for tour visitors from different parts of the world, which has helped us raise funds.
- Additionally, we have been invited to two corporate events and have also been approached by tour companies to perform drumming shows for their clients.





Sports program

Our sports program provides our members with much more than just a way to stay physically active. By taking part in this program, they gain access to a supportive environment where they receive mentorship to develop important life skills, and to foster a sense of belonging and empowerment. The program teaches them the value of discipline, a healthy lifestyle, consistency and perseverance to achieve their goals. Engaging in sports allows our learners to participate in constructive and healthy activities, keeping them occupied and away from negative influences. The program helps them channel their energy into sports activities rather than idling and possibly getting involved in harmful activities.

Hundertprozent has been a key partner in this transformative journey and their unwavering support has been instrumental in the success of our students. Their partnership with us aims to alleviate the financial burden of obtaining a driver's licence, reflecting their commitment to empowering learners. The impact of this program on our student's lives cannot be overstated. New KYP program

Smart Start program

Our centre has partnered with Smart Start to provide a transformative playgroup service for families in our community. This program offers a nurturing environment for children aged three to five years old, under the care of trained day mothers for three hours daily. It is free of charge and available to everyone in our community, providing a secure place for mothers to entrust their children while they attend to their morning routines.

The children receive two meals while under our care to maintain their well-being. Additionally, the program has allowed us to empower 17 members of our community who are now serving as day mothers, contributing to their personal growth and the socio-economic fabric of our community. We enrolled 150 children into the program, making a significant impact on the lives of families and our community at large. We are grateful for the opportunity to collaborate with Smart Start and turn our vision into action, creating a space where children thrive, mothers find help, and community members progress towards a stronger and more supportive community.



KYP matric rewrite

We have taken a big step in addressing the educational gap faced by many members of our community. Our centre now offers a chance for individuals to improve their matric results or to complete their high school education. We understand the challenges that come with not having a matric certificate and how daunting it can be for someone who comes from a disadvantaged background.

This incredible initiative allows us to provide hope for those who want to change their lives and reach their full potential. We are collaborating with the Peter Lengene Adult Training Institute to ensure our students have the best chance to succeed. The subjects that our program offers are Mathematical Literacy, English Additional/English Home Language and Geography with three professional teachers to facilitate those lessons. We have enrolled 30 students into our program, and they have all shown exceptional dedication and enthusiasm towards their studies.

As the matric rewrite centre continues to grow and positively impact lives, it stands as a beacon of hope for those seeking educational opportunities. We care about our community, and we want to help people get all the educational support they need to build a better future for themselves and their families.







Class of 2023 achievements

KYP matriculants

In total 13 of our learners obtained a bachelor's degree, paving the way for advanced education while five obtained a diploma and 10 proudly obtained a higher certificate, the remaining five qualified for supplementary examinations. Beyond the celebration of our learner's academic achievements, our commitment to their futures continues through our vocational development program. Through this program, we become steadfast companions in their journey towards greatness. They receive support with enrolling into tertiary, we get them ready for the formal economy through work readiness training and enrolment into internship programs.

Through establishing positive and productive relationships with various corporate companies, including the Capital Hotel, Transcend and Newbridge, we have successfully helped our alumni members secure permanent jobs. Our program continues to provide our graduates with the necessary skills and experience to excel in their careers and we take great pride in their achievements. We share in the pride of witnessing our learners evolve into the leaders and contributors of tomorrow. As they navigate the possibilities that lie ahead, our learners can rest assured that they have our full support for a bright future.





I am very grateful to report that 2023 was one of many years to be proud of. When I look at what we used to see as a dream but now witness them being a reality, it is so heartwarming. We celebrated our first year anniversary in our new space and are so humbled that our centre has touched a number of people's lives, and it does not only serve KYP members but the community of Kliptown and other surrounding communities.

My highlight for the year has to be the grade 12 rewrite program which provides an opportunity to people who never got the opportunity to finish their matric successfully. In providing access to this service to our community, brings nothing but hope and a chance for one to start again and build their lives the way they had dreamed and their assured that through opportunities given, it is possible.

We have also partnered with an organisation called Smart Start which equips children between the ages of three to five with the foundation for their success at school, and beyond. Smart Start program looks into providing early childhood education to children whose families do not have the means or can afford to enrol their children in pre-schools. This program empowers the right to education for young children and we at KYP, saw this as a great opportunity to help empower our young children who are always roaming around the street because their families lack resources to apply them into foundation learning.

I am happy to announce that we currently have more than 200 children enrolled into this program and receiving this education, this number shows greatly that the need is there. This program also empowers young mothers of the community who are not working and gives them the opportunity to champion this program and be the tutors of the children who attend this program by collaborating with them daily and helping them learn with them through play.

This has also played a huge role in helping decrease the unemployment rate in the community. We continue to learn about opportunities that could help us with strengthening the holistic services we render to our communities, we are now an organisation that has broadened the amount of services we are able to give to the community. We currently assist the community daily with their online applications for child support grants, social relief grants, school registrations and more. We are also very humbled and inspired by the increased demand of our services from all the four communities we currently serve and hope with more resources our work will continue to impact people's lives positively.

In closing, I would also like to first extend my heartfelt gratitude to Ms Gillian Ilsley who served on our Board from the year 2016/2017 until November 2023, her contribution to our community has made a big impact and we shall be forever grateful to her for all the seeds she has planted in our organisation.

I would also like to thank our donors, partners and other stakeholders for supporting KYP's work. We are who we are because of your continued support and love. You make it possible for us to continue.

Thank you again and I hope that you will enjoy reading about our journey in the year 2023.



Chairperson's message



The year 2023 marks a year of consolidation for KYP. A strategic refresh workshop was held in December 2022 attended by the entire KYP staff and Board, as is our custom. At this workshop we were able to confirm the five strategic pillars for our organisation. This provided focus and direction to the team during 2023.

Great progress was made in the institutional strengthening of KYP particularly in the area of finances and financial management. This was achieved due to the generous contribution and commitment of three of our supporters. This work has significantly improved our skills and understanding of financial management as an organisation. This included progress in the empowerment of all the KYP staff. We are very grateful for these contributions which have been game changing for us. To further augment our competence in this area, we have recruited a qualified chartered accountant, Tshepo Dhlamini to join our Board in 2024.

A new strategic pillar, called community development, has been made possible by the new building and facility. This has provided a much needed community centre for the people living in Kliptown. With our resources, KYP is now able to provide assistance with applications for Social Relief of Distress (SRD) grant, matric rewrite, parent education and skills development. The Smart Start program which we began in 2023 provided the opportunity for 20 unemployed community members to learn the skills and provide early childhood development to 250 children from Kliptown while earning a stipend.

Our education support programs supported 830 primary school members and 310 secondary high schools members. These numbers include the satellite sites of Klipspruit, Pimville and Dhlamini which service 352 primary school learners. It should be noted that over time the number of high school learners who attend the centre will increase as the grade 7's from the satellite sites move to secondary school. We employed 96 primary school tutors in the year and continued to expand appropriate technology options especially for mathematics and reading. Members who successfully passed matric in 2023.

In closing, I would like to thank all the generous friends, donors and supporters of KYP. Your generosity and care is greatly appreciated, and makes the difference, empowering the organisation to continue to serve the young people and now the community of the Kliptown area.


















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KYP engagements

Empowering women with crafting skills

In a small corner of our community, we are transforming the lives of a group of hard-working women through the power of crafting. These women are not just learning sewing skills, they are gaining the tools they need to support themselves and thrive in the formal economy.

We have sent five hard-working women with a business called Women With Vision to attend a five-day sewing training course. The women, some of whom are mothers of the children attending our after-school program, were equipped with advanced sewing skills and introduced to new sewing machines. Armed with a fabric kit containing materials, the women crafted various items from backpacks to stylish sun hats, utilising techniques such as appliqué lettering as well as motive (African continent).

At KYP we have been continuously helping the Women With Vision by letting them use our premises and sewing machines to do their crafting work for free. We also support them through purchasing their products and selling them to fundraise for the work that we do. Our support in 2023 has benefited the women with over R60 000 which enhanced their personal and business growth.

We are thankful to the Matson family for making the amazing training course possible for the Women with Vision. Their contribution enables us to continue to empower the women with a vision to thrive in the formal economy. The women are empowered through their skills and are fuelled by the ambition to expand their work to meet the growing market demand.

We are so proud of how far the ladies have come and encourage them to continue to use their skills to better themselves and those around them.













KYP documentary: Our series of community empowerment and growth





Independent auditor's report

To the members of Kliptown Youth Program

We have audited the financial statements of Kliptown Youth Program set out on page 35, which comprise the statement of financial position as at 31 December 2023, and the statement of comprehensive income, the statement of changes in equity and the statement of cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In our opinion, the financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Kliptown Youth Program as at 31 December 2023, and its financial performance and cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with the International Financial Reporting Standard for Small and Medium-sized Entities.

Basis for opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (ISAs). Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are independent of the organisation in accordance with the Independent Regulatory Board for Auditors' Code of Professional Conduct for Registered Auditors (IRBA Code) and other independence requirements applicable to performing audits of financial statements in South Africa.
